Cultural Resource Training is held at CWU in Ellensburg.

Frequent outdoor field trips are made to nearby site locations.

Resource identification & evaluation in the field, NW coast shell middens, petroglyphs, CCC structures, culturally modified trees, homesteads.

Stone tool production & analysis with demonstrations, reconstruction, manufacturing techniques & identification of stone characteristics.

Introduction to the National Register of Historic Places, how local and tribal groups value historic places, and the role of the DAHP.

Understanding state and federal regulations & compliance procedures, from routine compliance situations to complex mitigation.

Appreciation of Native American ethnobotany, historic artifacts, & how they may relate to your specific project.

Interpretations are presented in an environment encouraging open discussion of divergent opinions.
