On the web

The Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) website is the main source for traffic and road conditions. We frequently update traveler information and road conditions. Bookmark www.wsdot.wa.gov on your computer or smartphone.

We also report mountain pass conditions via our website. You can subscribe to Snoqualmie, Stevens, White and Blewett pass conditions via RSS.

Prepare for winter conditions.

You can find ways to prepare on WSDOT's winter website: www.wsdot.wa.gov/winter.

What if the WSDOT website gets slow or goes down?

If heavy Internet traffic makes it difficult to access WSDOT's website, WSDOT now offers other ways to access its traffic and travel information.

On the air

- Program your radio to WSDOT's Highway Advisory Radio before you leave: 530 AM and 1610 AM.
- Stay tuned to local media for weather and road information. WSDOT crews talk to news reporters every day. We send out highway alerts and give media outlets the opportunity to provide their viewers and listeners travel information.

On the phone

- Call 5-1-1 for travel information.
- Small Screen Traffic: Type www.wsdot.wa.gov/small into your mobile device and you can get maps, travel times and cameras, along with ferry schedules and mountain pass reports.
- Android or iPhone users just type in the term "WSDOT" in the app store or Market to download the WSDOT application.

Check before you get behind the wheel or have your passenger check – it's against the law to talk or text and drive.
