I-90 exit closure at SR 18 rescheduled for this weekend

Crews will close the eastbound I-90 exit to SR 18 near Snoqualmie this weekend to widen the left side of the off-ramp. We'll close the exit from 10 p.m. Friday, April 20 to 5 a.m. Monday, April 23. Traffic will be detoured to exit 27, Snoqualmie/North Bend, and onto westbound I-90 to access the westbound I-90 exit to SR 18. Drivers should expect congestion at the westbound I-90 exit to SR 18. This work, part of the [I-90 Eastbound Ramps to SR 18 Project](#), was rained out last weekend. The ramp will re-open at 5 a.m. Monday morning, but will be reduced to one lane until crews complete the work later that day.

Come and talk to our engineers about the project, and get a firsthand look at a full-scale roundabout we'll set up in the parking lot. You'll be able to see how it would be large enough to accommodate vehicles of all sizes.

Reminder about posting campaign signs

If you're a candidate or supporter preparing for future elections, remember that it's [illegal](#) to post campaign signs on the state highway right-of-way. Not sure if the spot you're eyeing is OK? Look for these clues:

- Utility poles are typically located inside state highway right-of-way. Avoid posting signs between the roadway shoulder and a utility pole.
- Many locations have a fence line separating the right-of-way from private property. If you post a sign on the roadway side of a right-of-way fence, it will likely be removed.

The best way to decide whether the location you're considering is legal is to check with us before you post your signs. Call 206-440-4471 or [e-mail us](#) to check the right-of-way boundaries for a particular highway.
