## Target Audience

For any individual who wants to become knowledgeable about cultural resources and possess the necessary skills to address basic resource management problems associated with cultural resources. Environmentalists, land management, natural resources, federal highways, tribal nations, forest service, local agencies, and other interested agencies are encouraged to attend.

## Course Description

This training will introduce participants to the value and significance of Washington's irreplaceable cultural resources. The class provides an exceptional opportunity for individuals to work with the northwest's most qualified instructors, visiting some of the area's finest examples of cultural resources and attending the only statewide training session of this caliber. There will be presentations by native Americans on their cultural perspective; speakers on state archaeology, prehistory of Washington, Native American ethnobotany, prehistoric stone artifacts, rare plants, logging in the northwest, federal and state cultural resource regulations and how it applies to your agency. There will be in-field\* lessons on learning how to "read" the landscape and recognize the probable cultural resources located at the site, and a sharing of preservation techniques and strategies.

\*Field trips to various locations which may include: Corral Site, Hunting Site, Crawford Barn and Farmstead, and/or The Dalles Mountain Ranch Cultural Landscape. Participants are advised to dress for all types of weather, and terrain; hiking boots, rain gear, sunscreen, hats and daypacks are recommended. You may encounter poison oak, nettles, and ticks. Cameras are encouraged.

A special evening event is a "Flintknapping Demonstration" by Dr. Jeff Flenniken. Two evening dinners are included with the registration fee. Those dinners will be at the Maryhill Museum and the Columbia George Discovery Center.

## Registration

There are 45 spaces available in each session and they are shared equally with WSDOT, Washington State Parks, and Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation. It is best to have your name placed on the wait list for the next class which is generally either May or October.
