Highlights

Keynote Speaker: Shelley Row



The WSDOT Public Transportation Division is pleased to welcome Ms. Shelley Row as one of our two keynote speakers at the 40th Annual Public Transportation Conference.

Shelley is a high-energy, engaging speaker and consultant working with top managers and leaders who must make fast, insightful decisions using *infotuition*[®] – the intersection of business pragmatics and gut feel. She interviewed 77 leaders from the public, private, academic and political sectors on the role of intuition in leadership. Interview results combined with neuroscience demonstrate the essential role information *and* intuition play in decision-making.

Leaders face increasingly complex decisions – decisions that are filled with ambiguity, uncertainty and risk. To remain competitive, you can't wait for complete data and certainty. You must decide and decide now. Successful leaders gather information *and* they pay attention to intuition – gut feel. Shelley Row's one-of-a-kind program and original research show you how to balance cognition and intuition in a skilled internal calculus.

Shelley's distinguished 30-year career as a transportation engineer started in 1984 when women engineers were few. She worked as a transportation engineer in Texas, California, Arizona, North Carolina and Georgia during the 1996 Olympic Games. She finished her career in the Senior Executive Service with the U.S. Department of Transportation where she ran a research program on "talking cars." She is an award-winning leader with top honors in her agency. Shelley is widely-known within the transportation community for her leadership, vision and organizational skills.

Keynote Speaker: Jarrett Walker

The WSDOT Public Transportation Division is pleased to welcome Mr. Jarrett Walker as our lunchtime keynote speaker at this year's conference.

Jarrett Walker is an international consultant in public transit network design and policy, with over 20 years of experience planning public transit in North America, Australia, and New Zealand. He and his team provide transit planning and executive advice to clients worldwide. Recent clients include cities or transit agencies in Houston, Edmonton, Indianapolis, Auckland (NZ), and Reykjavik (Iceland). He led the design phase of the massive Houston System Reimagining, a total network redesign implemented in August 2015, and also for a similar Auckland, NZ project being implemented gradually.



He is a frequent keynote speaker, both at conferences and at inspirational events building a city's interest and understanding of the public transit challenge.

He is a well-known innovator in leading the redesign of transit networks, in describing transit issues to the public, in building values-based policies and standards, and in running fun, interactive design processes for transit plans. He has taught graduate level transit courses and now offers a two-day intensive course on transit network design for both professionals and advocates.

His book, *Human Transit: How Clearer Thinking about Public Transit Can Enrich our Communities and our Lives* offering an introduction to transit issues is designed to help anyone form clearer views that reflect their own values. In addition to his consulting, teaching, and speaking, he writes about public transit issues at HumanTransit.org.
