Crews to build reinforced wall for future westbound SR 520 lanes beginning June 10

Construction crews will work nights for ten weeks to complete the wall

Beginning Monday, June 10, crews will build a second retaining wall north of SR 520, between Bellevue Way and 92nd Avenue Northeast. The work, which requires the closure of a single lane of westbound SR 520, will be completed at night to help keep traffic moving during the day. The wall will form the foundation for the wider highway and the regional bicycle and pedestrian path.

Details of the work:

- **Date:** Beginning Monday, June 10, for ten weeks or until complete
- **Time:** 8 p.m. to 5 a.m., Monday through Friday morning
- **Location:** North of SR 520 between Bellevue Way and 92nd Avenue Northeast

How crews will complete the work:

- Crews will backfill and form the reinforced wall using compacted soil
- Crews will use dump trucks to bring in soil and a vibrating roller to compact the soil

What you can expect:

- Neighbors can expect nighttime noise from trucks and equipment including excavators, loaders, rollers and trucks.
