WSDOT and its training partners help people PASS into brighter careers

WSDOT's Office of Equity and Civil Rights oversees a variety of initiatives aimed at diversifying the construction workforce and encouraging small, historically disadvantaged companies to pursue contract opportunities on WSDOT projects.

One of the office's initiatives is the Pre-Apprenticeship and Supportive Services Program, or PASS. Preapprenticeships are hands-on training programs that help people enter the construction trades. The PASS program awards grants to organizations that provide pre-apprenticeship training, employment preparation, and support services to women, minorities and other disadvantaged individuals seeking a pathway to familywage jobs in highway construction.

One of the organizations PASS supports is ANEW, a Tukwila-based nonprofit that helps women and people of color launch careers in construction.

"This is the first year of my life where I feel like this is where I am supposed to be," said Aidan Murphy, a young woman enrolled in ANEW's pre-apprentice training program. "I am at a point of upward momentum. Thanks to ANEW, I am now in an environment to thrive versus just survive."

Yahaira Garcia, another pre-apprentice trainee with ANEW, said, "High school doesn't really talk to you about the trades. I was excited to learn about ANEW, got lucky to get an incredible instructor and learn that I can build a future for myself and family."

WSDOT recently launched a multicultural media campaign to spread the word about the PASS program and some of the pre-apprenticeship organizations it supports with funding. The effort includes new online ads and website content on the PASS program (wsdot. wa.gov/employment/our-people/Pass/) and contractor opportunities (wsdot.wa.gov/employment/our-people/megaprogram/) on WSDOT's multibillion-dollar Megaprograms, with video testimonials from pre-apprentice trainees and diverse subcontractors working on the Megaprograms.

I-405/SR 167 Corridor Program

The I-405/SR 167 Corridor Program consists of a series of long-term improvements guided by the I-405 Master Plan and SR 167 Corridor Plan. For two decades, WSDOT has worked with cities, counties, federal agencies, transit agencies and community groups to develop consensus and deliver on a long- term vision for the multimodal redevelopment of this corridor. The Master Plan incorporates more than 150 individual but coordinated projects between SR 512 in Auburn and I-5 in Lynnwood. Total funding for the program is \$3.6 billion.

SR 520 Bridge Replacement and HOV Program

The SR 520 Program is enhancing public safety and mobility by replacing the highway's aging, vulnerable bridges and making significant transit and roadway improvements throughout the corridor. Program improvements extend from I-405 in Bellevue to I-5 in Seattle. So far, the program has rebuilt SR 520's Eastside segment and constructed a new floating bridge on Lake Washington. The effort now focuses on completing the highway's improvements from Lake Washington to I-5. The first stage of this work in Seattle, the Montlake Project, began in spring 2019. The program's total funding is \$4.9 billion.

Puget Sound Gateway Program


The Puget Sound Gateway Program is building critical freight links between the ports of Seattle and Tacoma and key distribution, warehouse and industrial areas in King and Pierce counties. Composed of the SR 167 Completion Project in Pierce County and the SR 509 Completion Project in King County, the Gateway Program is building about 12 miles of new roadway to complete two crucial, unfinished links in Washington's highway and freight network. Together, the projects will help ensure that people and goods move more reliably through the Puget Sound region. Total funding is \$2.69 billion.

Washington state's Healthy Environment for All (HEAL) Act Pursuing environmental justice and healthy communities for all

In Washington, the Legislature passed a far-reaching measure in 2021 to heal some of the government's past harms. Lawmakers passed the Healthy Environment for

All Act-or HEAL Actto identify and address the disproportionate health and environmental disparities affecting many



disadvantaged communities. A healthy environment for ALL.

How the HEAL Act addresses environmental justice

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency defines environmental justice as "the fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin or income, with respect to the development, implementation and enforcement of environmental laws, rules, and policies."

The HEAL Act inserts environmental justice considerations into the policies and actions of seven state agencies, including WSDOT. (The others are the departments of

Agriculture, Commerce, Ecology, Health, Natural Resources, and Puget Sound Partnership.) The core goal is for state government to inclusively engage communities of color and Native American tribes and to collectively tackle environmental health inequities that disproportionately harm their communities.

Roadmap for equity

We consider the HEAL Act a significant step forward in our state's effort to fight racism, promote equity for disadvantaged communities, and provide more opportunity for minority-owned businesses. The harms of past government policies and actions occurred over decades. Remedying those harms won't happen overnight. But the HEAL Act, we believe, provides a structure and tools for creating a healthier, more just future for all Washingtonians.

I-405/SR 167 Corridor Program

Construction progress and upcoming contracting opportunities

I-405, NE 85th Street Interchange and Inline BRT Station Project

Graham and WSDOT will kick off substantial construction activities in fall 2023 on the I-405, Northeast 85th Street Interchange and Inline Bus Rapid Transit Station Project. Early activities include tree removal, grubbing/clearing, and erosion control.

Upcoming scopes of work include aggregates and concrete, bridge anchors and bearings, dewatering, lumber supplies, logging, large sign structures, and stream diversion materials.

This Sound Transit-funded project includes voluntary minority and women business enterprise (MWBE) goals and enforceable small and veteran-owned business (SVBE) goals. SR 167 Corridor Improvements Project

WSDOT awarded the project to NorthupElcon, A Joint Venture, on July 14. WSDOT expects to begin construction on this project in late 2023. The project will open to traffic in 2025.

This project will upgrade the toll system on SR 167 and add a southbound auxiliary lane on SR 167 between SR 516 and S. 277th Street interchanges.

Potential scopes of work include upgrading the toll system, new ITS and illumination installations, minor shoulder widening at two new CCTV sites, pavement rehabilitations at spot locations, and maintenance of traffic.

I-405, Brickyard to SR 527 Improvement Project

The project will create a dual express toll lane (ETL) system on I-405 between the SR 522 and SR 527 interchanges.

WSDOT awarded this contract to Skanska on July 27. The program expects to complete construction in 2028. Potential scopes of work include bridge demolition, mass excavation, retaining and noise wall construction, stormwater infrastructure construction, toll infrastructure, and maintenance of traffic.

Crews are wrapping up final construction activities this year. The new roundabouts are scheduled to be operational by Sept. 4 and the ramps will be open to traffic by the end of the year.

I-405, Renton to Bellevue Widening and Express Toll Lanes Project

In September 2023, Flatiron-Lane, Joint Venture (FLJV) will reconfigure the Northeast 44th Street interchange in Renton to include a new, inline Bus Rapid Transit station and direct access ramps to and from the future express toll lanes, with Northeast 44th Street passing beneath the highway. As part of this work, crews have been building a new northbound I-405 bridge near Northeast 44th Street. Crews will shift all lanes of I-405 traffic to the new bridge to begin construction of the new southbound alignment.

SR 520 Bridge Replacement and HOV Program

Ashley Baldwin: Spreading her wings with Encore Environmental

"When you own a business, you have to have faith, do your best, and be honest." Words to live by from Encore Environmental owner Ashley Baldwin.

Encore Environmental works for Walsh Construction on WSDOT's SR 520/I-5 Express Lanes Connection Project. Her company stops contaminated stormwater from getting into local waterways. "Our job is to capture the water and treat it for contaminants. We run it through a filtration system with two filtering processes and discharge clean water."

Encore employs two of those systems on this project – one at the SR 520/I-5 interchange and one at the I-5/Mercer Street interchange in Seattle's South Lake Union neighborhood. Baldwin and her two employees have been on the job since 2021, with the project scheduled to wrap up in 2024. Baldwin got the contract with Walsh because someone remembered her from another job. In fact, most of her work comes by word of mouth.

Encore cites its proficiency in "environmental oversight, water quality monitoring, erosion control, stormwater management, environmental construction, and habitat restoration." Baldwin said she gets calls from people who have questions about their own projects and she frequently gives them free advice and lends a hand, knowing that this will build a relationship and potentially lead to more work. "My thing is I don't say no to anybody. I just want to help people. I don't want to walk away. Sometimes it's a \$1,500 invoice, but it can lead to \$70,000 or more."

Ashley Baldwin's company is certified by the state as both a woman-owned business enterprise and a disadvantaged business enterprise. She started her business because she wanted more control and flexibility in her schedule so she could both work and raise her children. "Sometimes when you work for other people, they put constraints on you and I just felt like I wouldn't live up to my full potential if I worked for someone else. I wanted to get out and spread my wings."

As for women who want it all, Ashley Baldwin says it's possible. "It's okay to not be available during certain times because you are being a mom. I've learned to not feel bad about that. It's also important to have the right team supporting you both at work and personally. Even if I make a mistake, I'm honest about it. Honesty has never gotten me fired. It has gotten me respect."

The Puget Sound Gateway Program is hosting a voluntary submitters meeting for the upcoming SR 167, SR 161 to SR 410 Rebuild Interchange (Stage 2a) project on Sept. 21 in Fife.

The SR 167, SR 161 to SR 410 Rebuild Interchange project will be the third design-build contract as part of delivering the SR 167 Completion Project. Primary scopes include bridges and walls, interchange and highway construction, earthwork, traffic systems modification, utilities relocation, roadside restoration and more.
